<p>How many different languages can you think of? Do you know what country they are from? With an adult, create a list or mark the countries on a map.</p>  <p>MLAN I-06</p>	<p>Search 'Numbers Song in French. Une Chanson des Chiffres' on YouTube. Can you sing along and learn your numbers in French? Film yourself for TEAMS or maybe even Twitter!</p> <p>MLAN I-01a</p>	<p>High 5! Draw round your hand and label each finger using the French words for 1 – 5. Want a challenge? Draw round the other hand for 6-10! Remember to use a word bank if needed.</p> <p>MLAN I-13</p>	<p>Find 'Mr Tumble – Nursery rhymes' on YouTube. Which is your favourite? Why? Can you learn the Makaton signs to join in?</p>  <p>MLAN I-05a</p>	<p>With an adult, research French manners (hello/please/thank you/sorry). Teach it to everyone in your house. Can your whole household use French manners for a whole day?</p> <p>MLAN I-01b</p>
<p>Use YouTube to find the video 'French Greetings song'. Can you practise and sing along with an adult?</p>  <p>MLAN I-01b</p>	<p>With an adult, research the different days of the week in French. Create a sign for every day. Find a spot in your house to display the correct sign. Remember to change it every morning!</p> <p>MLAN I-08a</p>	<p>Create a tea party with your toys/dolls/action figures/drawings. Use your knowledge of introductions in French and have your toys introduce themselves to each other (use the greetings song to help you if needed).</p> <p>MLAN I-07b</p>	<p>We all know the song 'I can Sing a Rainbow' but can you SIGN a rainbow? Search 'Makaton – I can Sing a Rainbow' on YouTube. Can you learn your colours and join in?</p> <p>MLAN I-01a</p>	<p>Number bingo! With an adult draw out a large cross and choose 4 numbers. Your grown up needs to guess your numbers using French. No peeking and remember to swap over!</p>  <p>MLAN I-08b</p>
<p>Have a look at 'Old McDonald had a farm – Singing Hands' on YouTube. Can you practise your Makaton signs for the different animals? Which is your favourite animal mentioned?</p> <p>MLAN I-01a</p>	<p>Have a scavenger hunt. Have an adult sign a colour then go and find as many examples of it as you can! Give yourself a time limit, how quickly can you move? Get an adult to take a photo of what you find.</p> <p>MLAN I-08b</p>	<p>Create a hopscotch outside with chalk (or inside with paper)! Can you practise your French numbers as you hop up and down it? Why not make a super long hopscotch up to 20?</p> <p>MLAN I-08b</p>	<p>Create a picture of a rainbow using any materials you want. With a partner, use your Makaton signs to tell them which colour to point to. Remember to swap!</p>  <p>MLAN I-11a</p>	<p>Use farm animal toys (or draw your own pictures). Use your animal signs to tell a partner which animal you want. Don't forget to swap!</p>  <p>MLAN I-08b</p>

<p>Create a French colours snap game. Create cards using the words for French colours and coloured pictures. Play with a family member. If you match the word and colour you keep the pair. Who wins?</p>  <p>MLAN 2-04a</p>	<p>English has 'borrowed' a lot of words from many different languages! Use your research skills to discover which French words have been added to English. How could you display your learning? Consider using PowerPoint, posters, mind map etc. . .</p> <p>MLAN 2-11b</p>	<p>BSL is a language used by the deaf and hard of hearing. Search 'BSL GREETINGS Basic Signs' on YouTube. Have a look at these basic greetings in BSL. Can you use them with someone at home? Remember – you must still speak when you sign.</p> <p>MLAN 2-01b</p>	<p>French and English are very different. One major difference is that every noun (naming word) is either masculine, feminine or plural. Research a range of French words for objects in your house. Sort them into lists; masculine, feminine or plural.</p> <p>MLAN 2-11d</p>	<p>Create a comic strip using French greetings. Search 'French Greetings Song for Children' on YouTube to help with the spelling.</p>  <p>MLAN 2-06a</p>
<p>Check out 'Stories, poems and songs class clips' on BBC bitesize. Choose one to watch and create a summary about it in English. What was your favourite/least favourite part? Who would you recommend it to? What new French words did you learn?</p> <p>MLAN 2-01a</p>	<p>Translating is an important skill in modern languages. Use a French dictionary or online translation service to translate as many animals you can think of into French.</p> <p>For example: the cat – le chat.</p>  <p>MLAN 2-11a</p>	<p>Make a French calendar. Research and create cards for the days of the week, months of the year, and numbers 1-31. Choose a spot in your house and set up your French calendar. Remember to change it every day.</p> <p>MLAN 2-01b</p>	<p>BSL users use finger spelling all the time. Check out 'BSL Alphabet' on YouTube. What can you spell? Can you spell your name? School's name? Pets name? The more you practise, the better you get!</p>  <p>MLAN 2-11c</p>	<p>Fingerspelling can be used to practise your spelling/tricky words. With an adult, practise your spelling words, using your finger spelling to help learn the order of letters. Can you sign a word to an adult? Can they guess correctly?</p>  <p>MLAN 2-11d</p>
<p>Choose a scene which would include lots of animals (zoo/farm/Noah's ark etc). Create a picture of the scene and label the animals using your French Vocabulary.</p>  <p>MLAN 2-11c</p>	<p>Imagine that you have been tasked with creating a poster for a classroom. Use your knowledge of colours in French to create a word bank poster. Use text, drawings, and colours – this can be done on the computer if you prefer. Remember to consider what age of children you are designing for. P1? P7?</p> <p>MLAN 2-11a</p>	<p>Numbers in BSL are easy to learn and are very useful while signing. Check out 'Let's Learn BSL! Lesson 2 – Numbers' on YouTube to practise. Can you sign your phone number? Your house number?</p>  <p>MLAN 2-04a</p>	<p>Introducing yourself in a language is a great way to start a conversation. YouTube 'Let's Learn BSL! Lesson 3 – Greetings' to learn how to introduce yourself. Use your fingerspelling knowledge to add in your own name.</p> <p>MLAN 2-02a</p>	<p>Check out the games on French-games.net online. There are loads of games to practise your vocabulary. Focus on colours and animals and try out some different games. If you find one which you particularly enjoy, share it with others on TEAMS.</p> <p>MLAN 2-08b</p>



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Spicy Grid

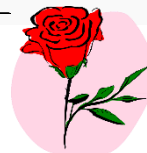

BSL and Makaton are languages which both use hand signals/signs, however they are different. Use your research skills to learn more about these two languages. Think about how old they are/who uses them/who created them/famous users etc. . . Create a Powerpoint to present your findings. Consider graphics, font, colour.
